I haven't used my horn once – not that I haven't been tempted but, it HAS been hard to obey all the rules. For three years I have been used to following an aggressive/defensive form of driving and it is hard to get back into following a different set of unwritten rules for the road.

It has been 5 months since I stepped onto Canadian soil and I have truly enjoyed soaking in my home, my family, my friends, good food and snowy weather. It is a precious thing to be back, yet my heart aches for Tumu and my home on the other side of the ocean. It is hard for me to look at pictures and as much as I love talking about Ghana (it's my favourite thing to do) it reminds me of all that I miss there and I am excited to get back there in July.

As I have been travelling, something that has stood out to me along the way is hospitality. I have gone from place to place, home to home, coffee shop to coffee shop, bed to bed. All along the way God has given me a tangible gift of His love through all those that I have encountered. Not only have I had a pillow for my

these things are an indication of the heart of hospitality. A heart that cares. Having experienced these many gifts – I am undone and humbled by the opportunity to be invited into your lives. I have been blessed because I have been in a place of needing people along the way to help me in physical ways, but have been left encouraged by the deeper things.

But has this gift of hospitality slowly been fading in our culture? I have lots of memories of shared times with people, doing activities together and lots of hospitality given and taken. There is something beautiful in being together, eating, talking, laughing and sharing. If we don't spend time with each other, then we miss the opportunities to share our lives - we miss sharing our hearts. Ultimately, sharing the love of Christ. Hospitality is about living invitationally.

In Ghana, hospitality is built into the culture. One of the phrases I learned very early on is "You are invited." Any time that you come upon people eating food in front of you, they will invite you to join them with "Ah di kia" – you are invited. There is a friendliness that accompanies this question and an invitation to be a part of their lives. Conversation flows and relationships are built, and it all started with an invitation. It has been a challenge to me to not only invite people into my home, over for a meal or to stay a while – it is a challenge to me to invite people to share my life, my love and to share Christ. My hospitality will not run out when it overflows with the source of Christ. But it sure is a challenge – hospitality requires time, effort, energy, love, compassion. It requires sacrifice. I don't always have these or even want to sacrifice and that's why I can't do it alone. I need God's help to give me what so easily runs out or is not there to begin with.

Is God calling us to more? How do we continue to live our lives invitationally especially in light of this corona virus where we are asked to socially distance ourselves. We need wisdom and creativity in how to still reach out to people and invite them in. The call to practice hospitality is still the same, it may just look a little bit different in light of this virus. The passage in Romans 12 (above) is such a good reminder of what God is calling us to do. I am looking forward to hearing how God can use each of us to encourage others in this difficult time. May He give me a heart like yours as you invited me so graciously into your lives and your heart as I trekked across the provinces, showed up in your day, ate your food and layed my head on your pillows.
